



On April 18, 2019, testimony from bill sponsor Representative Michael Grieco (D - Miami Beach), Galt Mile President Pio Ieraci and Association Advocate Ellyn Bogdanoff convinced the House Commerce Committee to approve opt-out House Bill 647 (HB 647) by a vote of 19 Yeas vs. 1 Nay, after which it was sent to the full House for a floor vote.

By April 25, Senator Ed Hooper's (R - Palm Harbor) punitive Senate Bill 908 was DOA, as its companion House Bill 723 was frozen on the calendar in the other chamber. These skewed bills sought to levy a \$500 per day penalty for high-rise associations that fail to install an Engineered Life-Safety System (ELSS) by the statutory deadline.

The full House approved HB 647 by a vote of 103 Yeas vs. 7 Nays on April 26. While our opt-out bill was overwhelmingly supported in the House, Hooper leveraged the Senate's "Old Boy Network", bartering political capital to buy two of the three vetting committee chairs in the Senate, who stalled our companion Senate Bill 1152 in their respective committees (Community Affairs; Rules). To circumvent this roadblock, Rep. Grieco sent his successful House Bill 647 directly to the Senate for its approval, obviating the legislation's reliance on the frozen companion Senate Bill.

Hooper Runs a Shell Game

Fearful of the opt-out bill's growing momentum, Hooper colluded with Fire Sprinkler Association lobbyists to derail HB 647 if it passed in the House. Dipping into the Fire Sprinkler Association's bottomless wallet, they retained high-powered Nick larossi of Capital City Consulting (CCC) - among the State's most powerful lobbying juggernauts (along with Southern Strategy Group (SSG), Ballard Partners and Ron Book). By manipulating rules and purchasing lawmakers, CCC specializes in capsizing legislation. For an astronomical fee, CCC built Hooper a protocol trap door with a set of instructions.

When the "House-approved" opt-out bill was sent to the Senate, Hooper countered by filing what's called a "Strike-All Amendment", which substitutes new language for the bill's existing text. Hooper's amendment replaced the opt-out language with the predatory demands of his ill-fated SB 908, including the \$500 per day non-compliance penalty.

He additionally salted in a few land mines. Hooper sought to functionally neuter an existing statutory provision that had empowered association homeowners to legally forgo a full fire sprinkler retrofit, a maneuver that could cripple future efforts to enact an ELSS opt-out and shield abusive local fire marshals who exceed their authority.

As the session winds down each year, scores of scrambling lawmakers with legislation stranded on committee calendars desperately try to amend their otherwise doomed provisions into any surviving bill. One consequence is the formation of "trains" - huge eclectic bills that blend productive provisions with half-baked measures and pork-pie rip-offs. Each issue added to a train requires another approval in both chambers. These questionably vetted mega-bills are added to the hundreds of last-minute votes already scheduled on the House or Senate floor. As a result, frenzied lawmakers often rubber-stamp scores of bills they know nothing about. Exploiting the attendant confusion, Hooper solicited Senate approval for the hijacked opt-out bill as Friday afternoon came to a close - too late for a challenge.

Bogdanoff Battles Back

Since Hooper morphed HB 647 into swill, Bogdanoff met with lawmakers and bill proponents to craft a salvage plan. After futile discussions with a recalcitrant Hooper, they decided to ditch the mutated HB 647 and recruit an alternative vehicle for its key provisions. On May 2, Senator Jeff Brandes (R - St. Petersburg) twice attempted to amend the opt-out language into House Bill 1703 (HB 1703), a Housing and Development bill that was passed by the full House and poised for Senate approval.

When a Point of Order raised by Hooper forced Brandes to withdraw his amendments, Bogdanoff brokered a compromise. Although another amendment offered by Brandes on May 3 lacked the opt-out language, it extended the installation deadline from December 31, 2019 to January 1, 2024. Bogdanoff's response would stop certain local Fire Marshals from threatening to "red tag" associations that missed the approaching installation deadline, add four additional opportunities to enact an ELSS opt-out, debunk bogus testimony by fire sprinkler lobbyists that the mandate only affects a handful of Floridians, and refute the legal basis for the State Fire Marshal's current policy.

The amendment requires the Office of State Fire Marshal to collect data on the 4,037 Florida Associations that legally opted out of a full fire sprinkler retrofit, and submit those findings to the Governor, Senate President and the Speaker of the House.

Heather Moraitis' APRIL 2019 Newsletter

*In her April 2019 Newsletter, District 1 City Commissioner Heather Moraitis describes the rebirth of an iconic Fort Lauderdale site that will once again house a major sports team - at least for two years. The City approved a plan to transition Lockhart Stadium from a browned out wasteland overgrown with weeds to a major league soccer venue with an 18,000-seat modern stadium, a training academy, administrative offices, a community center, a dog park, a running trail, playground, public park and facilities that will accommodate a second professional soccer franchise from the United Soccer League (USL). She also applauds the "Uptown 5k on the Runway" - a Run / Walk event at Fort Lauderdale Executive Airport; congratulates the Westminster Academy men's basketball team for winning their third consecutive FHSAA Class 4A Basketball State Championship; and celebrates April as Water Conservation Month by promoting the Broward Water Partnership's (BWP) Conservation Pays program.

Reincarnating Lockhart

Lockhart Stadium owes its suddenly bright future to two converging events, competing private sector development bids and the recent approval of a Parks Bond issue. Led by soccer superstar David Beckham, Miami Beckham United will temporarily deliver Inter Miami CF (AKA – Club Internacional de Fútbol Miami), his soccer franchise in the Major League Soccer (MLS) organization.

The Beckham group plans to begin demolition in July and open for business by March, 2020. Two years later, Beckham's team will occupy a brand-new 25,000-seat stadium in a planned \$1 billion commercial complex called Miami Freedom Park, replacing the 73-acre city-owned Melreese golf course in Miami. Thereafter, Beckham will still maintain the Lockhart training facility.

While the Fort Lauderdale sports venue will also be used by local schools, the city could later cut a deal with another professional sports club, perhaps the FXE Futbol franchise that made a losing bid to build and occupy Lockhart. Miami Beckham United will invest \$60 million to develop the Lockhart complex. As a consequence of the March 12 voter approval of a \$200 million Parks Bond, another \$25 million could be funneled into Lockhart improvements.

Lockhart is Born

Lockhart Stadium and the adjacent Fort Lauderdale Stadium baseball park were built in 1959. Named for former city commissioner H. Y. "Doug" Lockhart and dedicated at a football game on September 18, 1959, the sports complex was originally expected to host football games and track and field competitions for four local high schools (Fort Lauderdale High School, Stranahan High School, Northeast High School, and Dillard High School).

After twenty years of hosting high school football and track events - and occasional state football and soccer competitions, in 1977 Lockhart Stadium became the home field of the Miami Toros of the original North American Soccer League (NASL) - who rebranded themselves as the Fort Lauderdale Strikers.

This launched Lockhart's long association with soccer. At the November 23, 1980 World Cup qualifier in Lockhart, the United States men's national soccer team orchestrated the first U.S. defeat of Mexico in over 46 years, winning by 2–1. When the Strikers moved to Minnesota in 1982, Lockhart returned to hosting high school sports and the occasional Miami Dolphins pre-season scrimmage.

The Miami Fusion F.C. of Major League Soccer (MLS) renovated the stadium in 1998, increasing seating capacity to 20,000 and redesigning the field expressly for soccer. Since all other MLS teams typically played in football stadiums, this was a sea change that triggered the league's eventual trend toward soccer-specific stadiums. As the Fusion was contracted by the league in 2002, Lockhart was refitted once again in 2003 for use by the Florida Atlantic University Owls college football team until 2011, when the Owls relocated to their on-campus FAU Stadium in Boca Raton.

During this period, the stadium hosted D.C. United's high-profile 1998 victory over Vasco da Gama in the Interamerican Cup, Billy Graham's final South Florida crusade in 1985, and the 2007 Caribbean Carnival for Broward County (after Miramar gave them the boot).

Fight for Lockhart

Two years after moving to Lockhart Stadium from Miami in 2009, Miami FC also changed its name to the Fort Lauderdale Strikers, although the team abandoned Lockhart in 2016 and moved to a stadium at Central Broward Regional Park. Within months, the Strikers were disbanded and Lockhart became an empty shell. A \$70-million Water Park proposal for Lockhart Stadium by Schlitterbahn was legally challenged and tied up in court by the owners of competing Rapids Water Park in Riviera Beach, in cahoots with FXE Futbol. Having achieved their objective of discouraging a prospective competitor, Rapids Water withdrew its rival water park proposal, but FXE Futbol still had plans for Lockhart

Led by Managing Director John P. Reynal, in 2017 FXE Futbol proposed renovating Lockhart Stadium for a future Division II USL Championship squad. While Beckham's Inter Miami CF is in the top-tier Major League Soccer organization, FXE Futbol has applied for a second tier United Soccer League franchise. For the next two years, Reynal sought approval from the league and the City to develop a complex at Lockhart that i ncluded soccer and multi-purpose fields, park space, dining and retail options, and a Topgolf facility.

On January 28, 2019, Miami Beckham United (representing Inter Miami CF) submitted a competing proposal to the Fort Lauderdale City Commission for the design, construction and maintenance of a state-of the-art soccer training facility, a multi-purpose sport stadium and a sport-centric community destination in the Lockhart site.

At an April 2, 2019 meeting, the City Commission unanimously conferred a higher rank on Inter Miami's plan for the Lockhart Stadium site. To shed light on the Commission's preference for Beckham's bid over Reynal's problematic proposal, Mayor Dean Trantalis explained "FXE Futbol did not have a commitment from their league and therefore even if we approved them there was no saying they'd ever have a team playing here." City officials also cited how Beckham's star power would guarantee his venture's success.

Skull-blocked by the adverse Commission vote, on April 15, Reynal sued Fort Lauderdale for violating State law by neglecting to convene a third-party professional review of the competing proposals, and filed an April 23 injunctive motion to block the impending demolition. To Reynal's dismay, on May 3, Broward Circuit Judge Raag Singhal denied the motion, citing how FXE Futbol failed to provide "evidence of the likelihood that its proposal would have been ranked first if any such 'professional review' had been performed on the proposals." In short, the Commission's rationale for selecting Beckham proved legally bulletproof, and the demolition should begin in July. The data would be predicate to a request for a Declaratory Statement by Florida CFO Jimmy Patronis (AKA – State Fire Marshal). Specifically, it would ask whether local Fire Marshals have the right to require the installation of fire sprinklers in associations that opted out in compliance with State law.


As questionably interpreted in a May 4, 2016 Declaratory Statement, the office of State Fire Marshal
contends that although demanding fire sprinklers in
associations that opted out violates State law,
mandating sprinklers under the guise of an ELSS
complies with the Florida Fire Prevention Code. A
legally accurate response by the State Fire Marshal to
this new inquiry should demonstrate that the current
policy is based on the mistaken premise that an
Administrative Code trumps State Law. It doesn't.

Sweating it Out

Approved by the full Senate on May 3 by a vote of 26 Yeas vs. 13 Nays, the newly amended HB 1703 was then passed in the House by a floor vote of 66 Yeas vs. 42 Nays, engrossed, enrolled and lined up for the Governor's desk. Unfortunately, there is a downside to hitching a ride on another lawmaker's bill. Since other provisions in HB 1703 promote the interests of developers, some proponents expressed concern about how a controversy surrounding those measures could impact the bill's enactment.

To avoid overwhelming the Governor's office, literally hundreds of engrossed bills are sent to his desk a few at a time. As of May 17, HB 1703 was still awaiting Gubernatorial review. Nine years ago, Bogdanoff admonished, "Until an approved bill survives a veto, there are no guarantees." That said, on May 17, she popped off a brief update "Here with Brandes and the Gov. I was told by Brandes we are good." Always cautious, she later added "The bill has not yet been presented to the Governor. I know they are analyzing it but he cannot do anything until he receives it."

In navigating a litany of bear-traps conceived by Hooper and an army of well-funded lobbyists, Senators Jason Pizzo and Jeff Brandes, Representatives David Grieco, Bob Rommel, Chip LaMarca — and especially Ellyn Bogdanoff — stretched a seven-month ELSS installation deadline to 2024, providing several million threatened Florida residents with a variety of regulatory and legislative opportunities to beat back this \$multi-billion scam (unless the bill is drop-kicked by the Governor). We are lucky to have them.*

New Life for Lockhart Stadium

Great news for the Lockhart Stadium site! Earlier this month, the City Commission took a major step toward redeveloping this important property. We unanimously voted to enter into an agreement with Miami Beckham United, a group led by soccer legend David Beckham, on a visionary project for the 64-acre site.

The Beckham group is ready to invest up to \$60 million to transform the property into a "soccer-centric community destination." Preliminary plans call for the construction of a new state-of-the-art 18,000-seat soccer stadium where Beckham's Major League Soccer (MLS) team, Inter Miami CF, would play its first two seasons. An interim agreement is currently being negotiated that will allow the Beckham Group to expeditiously move forward with site preparation and demolition so that the stadium can be completed by February 2020 in time for the start of next year's MLS season.

In addition to the stadium, the Lockhart site would serve as Inter Miami's base of operations, main training center, home to a United Soccer League (USL) farm team, and headquarters for a youth soccer academy that would groom the next generation of elite soccer players. The complex would also include team and administrative offices, locker rooms, weight rooms, classrooms, dining facilities, medical and rehabilitation facilities, and practice fields.

The Beckham group would bring millions of dollars in public enhancements to the property including the development of a public park, dog park, playground, public multi-purpose fields, and a walking/jogging/fitness trail. The Commission is also committed to building an additional stadium that our local public schools could use for football and other athletic activities.

I'm excited about partnering with the Beckham group to bring significant improvements to the site and expand public access to new facilities and amenities in our community. The group's investment, coupled with the recent passage of the Parks Bond, will provide additional options to fund even more enhancements and amenities on the property, like the new community center.

This is truly a once-in-a-lifetime project that offers our City a unique opportunity to create a family-oriented destination on one of our largest remaining unused tracts of land, and in doing so,

leave a lasting legacy for future generations to use and enjoy.

I have already had numerous meetings and discussions with many of you, regarding the community amenities and I plan to continue to seek your input, thoughts, and ideas as this project moves forward. Please keep an eye out for more details and further updates in the months ahead!

Congratulations WA Men's Basketball Team

The WA Men's Varsity Basketball Team accomplished a historic feat yesterday afternoon, with a 77–73 win over Seffner Christian in Lakeland. The victory was the third consecutive FHSAA Class 4A Basketball State Championship for the team.

This marks the first time in WA school history that a team sport has won three straight state championships. It is also noteworthy that this has only occurred one other time in the sport of men's basketball by a Broward County school.

There was a large contingent of students and fans that made the trip to Lakeland to support Coach Ehren Wallhoff and the team. Those who remained in school were able to view the game at an all-school "watch party" in the Kennedy Fellowship Hall.

It was fitting that the Lions were led yesterday by seniors, Sam Griffin and Chase Johnston. Sam tallied 24 points to lead the team and Chase totaled 19. Freshman Ben Middlebrooks contributed 18 points on perfect 8 for 8 shooting.

The Lions finished with an amazing 25-4 record after a rigorous regular season schedule. Lamar Fisher's APRIL 2019 Newsletter

*In his April 2019 Newsletter, District 4 Broward Commissioner Lamar Fisher marvels at how Broward County's Traffic Engineering Division Management Center struggles to keep traffic moving on County and City roadways; reviews the benefits (and limits) of a Text-to-911 emergency service that was recently integrated into Broward's county-wide Emergency 911 Dispatch System; applauds the cost-saving opportunities for constituents who participate in the recent revival of Solar Co-ops in Broward County; and supports the newly launched Ride Safe Campaign at Fort Lauderdale - Hollywood International Airport, which urges travelers to avoid using unauthorized ground transportation providers, given the attendant risk for rip-offs, robberies – or worse.

TEXT-TO-911: WHEN CALLING IS NOT AN OPTION
Twelve years after mandated by Broward voters in
2002, Broward County finally implemented a Consolidated Emergency Dispatch System on October 1,
2014. as eleven unlinked call centers (i.e. public
safety answering points – or PSAPs) in 31 Broward
municipalities were reconstituted as 3 regional
PSAPs in Coconut Creek, Sunrise and Pembroke
Pines. The PSAPs use the same technology platforms
and operate under common call taking and dispatch
protocols, enabling each center to seamlessly manage calls from anywhere in the County. The new Regional 911 System serves 29 of Broward's 31
municipalities, as Coral Springs and Plantation opted
to fund their own PSAPs with city taxes.

Text-to-911 was developed to address the communication constraints placed on certain callers by affliction or circumstance. It is especially useful for people who may be deaf, hard-of-hearing, speech impaired or if speaking aloud might prove dangerous (i.e. active shooter incidents, home invasions, domestic violence, etc.). When a Text-to-911 message is received by phone carriers that support testing services, it is sent to their text control centers which then forward the message to the appropriate 911 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) in Broward County.

To use the service, first silence the phone (or device), open the message App and enter 911 in the "TO" field. After entering your location and a brief detail of the emergency, hit "SEND" - and if possible - get to safety.

SOLAR POWER CO-OP IN BROWARD

District 4 Broward Commissioner Lamar Fisher notes that Broward County expects to source 20% of its energy from renewables, although County plans for alternative energy are more extensive. In 2008, Broward County passed a resolution which establishes a community-wide greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction target of 80 percent below 2007 emissions by 2050.

While installing solar panels will diminish the carbon footprint and reduce contributions to global warming and sea-level rise, most people are far more intrigued by the prospect of saving a bundle. A Solar Co-op seeks to expand the availability of less expensive solar power by cutting the initial installation costs.

In discussing how bulk purchasing will facilitate the transition to solar power, Chief Resilience Officer of

Broward County Dr. Jennifer Jurado explained, "Solar coops bring technical support and economies of scale through the collective purchase power of our diverse community members. All of our residents deserve the benefits that come with this investment, including dramatic energy savings on a monthly basis."

In short, a competitive bulk price for 30 panel installations is a fraction of the vendor charges for individual customers. State and federal rebates, incentives, or tax credits for solar equipment or energy efficiency improvements further mitigate the initial costs. The largest regulatory offsets are the federal renewable energy tax credits for businesses and residences.

You can start small. In fact, the most cost-effective solar energy projects are water heating systems. Solar hot water systems are inexpensive - and provide residents with a wide range of alternative configurations. Neither condos, co-ops nor HOAs can stop you. The Florida Solar Rights Act prohibits neighborhood or condo associations from barring homeowners from installing solar panels on their residences.

To install a system that will pay for itself many times over, you need to know the ropes. The informational sessions referenced by Fisher will fill the bill. Hosted by the non-profit Solar United Neighbors, the next meetings are scheduled for 6 p.m. on May 21, 2019 at the Pompano Beach Cultural Center (50 W. Atlantic Boulevard) in Pompano Beach and for 6 p.m. on May 22, 2019 at the Miramar Branch Library (2050 Civic Center Place) in Miramar. Broward County's Traffic Engineering
Division As a new County Commissioner, I'm
having the great pleasure of learning the ins
and outs of County Government. One of the
exciting parts of my new role is getting a behind
the scenes look at the amazing work that is
being done by the 6,000+ county employees in
different departments and divisions through out
the organization.

Most recently I had the opportunity to tour Broward County's Traffic Engineering Division Management Center and Operations Building. I was amazed to learn about the County's role in signal coordination on such a large and robust traffic system. The system includes over 1,400 signalized intersections, over 28,000 signal heads, over 1,200 school zone flasher locations and 100,000's of signs and pavement markings. Traffic control devices on County and City roadways are maintained 24/7. State roadways signalization is also controlled by the County unless roadway construction projects are underway, which then reverts the signalization to State officials during the construction period and back to the County once construction is complete. The value in operating all the signals is that we have one unified and cohesive signal system across the entire County.

Most impressive is that approximately 90% of trouble calls are responded to in less than 1 hour by County's dedicated and talented personnel. We often talk about the equipment and technology but forget about the people that operate and maintain the system. Broward County has the most dedicated and talented field personnel you can find. They work hard every day, in traffic – in the heat and humidity and that shows with the superb response times!

APRIL 2019 UPDATE

Text to 911 On Tuesday, April 2, Broward County officially launched the new Text-to-911 emergency service. Text-to-911 allows you to send text messages to local 911 dispatch centers during an emergency, when calling is NOT an option. Text-to-911 is another tool for people to get help in a life-threatening emergency. It is not a substitute for calling 911 and is designed to help the hearing and speech impaired who may not be able to communicate by calling 911, or anyone who fears they'll put themselves in danger by speaking out loud. Below are several important factors to know before using the new text to 911 service.

- Know your exact location.
- Cell phone providers only offer text messaging as a "best efforts service;" delivery of text messages are not guaranteed, can be delayed by your carrier and may not be received in a timely manner.
- DO NOT send photos, videos, or emoji's.
- Keep text messages plain and easy to understand no slang or abbreviations.
- Texts to 911 have a 160-character limit for a single text.
- The Text-to-911 system currently processes texts in English; language translation is currently not available.
- You must have text messaging included on your wireless phone plan.
- If texting to 911 is not available in your area, your phone carrier will send you a
 message requesting that you make a voice call to 911.
- Text-to-911 is not a social media app. It is to be used for EMERGENCIES only.
- Misuse of 911 can result in criminal charges, fines, and jail time.

EDITOR'S COMMENTARY State Rep. Chip LaMarca's APRIL 2019 Newsletter

In his late-session legislative updates, District 93 Statehouse Representative Chip LaMarca's April message distinguishes between Vacation Rental bills that empower local governments to protect home values and those that destroy residential communities. In May, LaMarca announces annually enacted Sales Tax Holiday events that offer back-to-school savings or tax-free hurricane preparedness supplies; notes the funding of clean water standards, Everglades Restoration, Beach Renourishment and other critical environmental priorities long neglected by the previous administration; and applauds passage of a comprehensive firefighter cancer benefits program that will help plug a nationwide gap in the safety net of afflicted firefighters.

VACATION RENTALS DILEMMA

While short-term vacation rentals can be a win-win for visiting tourists and local landlords, if they aren't properly regulated, they can undermine the character (and home values) in a Condominium, Cooperative, or Homeowner Association, increase the tax burden on their residents, and endanger prospective tenants. While few homeowners will complain if a nice family rents the property next door for the season, they will understandably object if the same property is used by a slime ball to set up a Meth Lab.

The vacation rental market has long contributed to the State's tourism economy, although sea changes during the past decade triggered a growing controversy. When upside down mortgages left families insolvent during the recession, speculators who swooped in to graze on hundreds of thousands of foreclosed homes either flipped selected properties or repeatedly rented them out. It was no coincidence that these rentals expanded epidemically near popular vacation sites like Orlando and along coastal tourism Meccas like Miami and Fort Lauderdale. This overnight proliferation of homes in residential neighborhoods that functionally serve as flop houses (commercial properties) set the stage for a regulatory tug-of-war in Tallahassee.

Some of the new landlords applied for state and local lodging licenses although many did not. Local taxes collected from tourists by hotels, bed & breakfasts or vacation rentals support the maintenance of roads & infrastructure - and help fund local public services (i.e. police, fire, EMS, etc.) - which are used by millions of visiting tourists each year. Since these expenses are otherwise funded with taxpayer dollars, when landlords who operate functionally commercial properties fail to collect sales and "tourism" taxes (or pocket those revenues), you pay the resulting shortfall.

ERASING LOCAL LAWS

Zoning laws ordinarily protect home values by preserving the character of residential neighborhoods; and prohibiting homeowners from turning adjacent properties - or condominium / cooperative units - into industrial or commercial venues. In contrast, vacation rental advocates claim that homeowners have the right to use their properties as they see fit, even if it morphs thriving neighborhoods into ghost towns. By operating transient motels as vacation rentals, speculators dodge compliance with these zoning

laws to make a fast buck - at the expense of nearby home values.

While Florida lawmakers struggled to balance the right of investors to turn a profit, the right of association homeowners to protect their home values and residential character, and the right of local governments to regulate local businesses - the playing field was turned on its head by the emergence of Airbnb, HomeAway and other "sharing" services that enable any homeowner to list a property, a spare bedroom - or a damp mattress on the garage floor - on the internet. Since the listing companies' online rental transactions are nearly impossible to track, speculators that operate "below the radar" often ignore licensing requirements and dodge compliance with community association rules and local laws - frustrating local governments - and taxpayers forced to pick up the fiscal slack.

BUYING BLOCKBUSTING LAWMAKERS

The \$38 billion vacation rental goliath Airbnb dispatched lobbyists and purchased lawmakers in key markets to shield its business model from meddlesome local regulations. Amid a blizzard of Airbnb legal actions against Florida jurisdictions perceived as "uncooperative", former Statehouse Representative Michael Horner (R - Kissimmee) spearheaded company plans to mute local governments, filing House Bill 883.

Enacted on June 2, 2011, the law preempted cities and counties from prohibiting or regulating short term rentals. As a concession to millions of angry homeowners and the Florida League of Cities, Horner agreed to grandfather local regulations adopted prior to June 1, 2011. Horner later resigned following discovery of his name on the client list of an Orange County brothel.

Following a statewide outcry by local governments, in 2014, the legislature passed Senate Bill 356, which eased the broad state preemption on regulation of vacation rentals, allowing local governments to regulate short-term rentals through life safety and building codes, but Section 509.032(7), Florida Statutes, preserved the prohibition on local governments against regulating the duration and frequency of these rentals, or enforcing zoning laws that bar the commercialization of residential neighborhoods - and community associations.

2019 BAD BILLS

Focused on obliterating any threat to its bottom line, AirBNB spends 100s of \$millions in Florida jurisdictions to quash local laws that protect the rights of its residents. Early each year, AirBNB goes shopping in Tallahassee. In 2019, they bought Statehouse Representative James "J.W." Grant (R - Port Charlotte) and Florida Senators David Simmons (R - Seminole) and Manny Diaz, Jr. (R - Hialeah), who all filed bills to eliminate the limited rights of local governments to regulate vacation rentals. Grant filed House Bill 987, Diaz sponsored Senate Bill 824 and Simmons filed two bills on behalf of AirBNB - Senate Bills 812 and 814.

On the bright side, since randomly turning homes into flop joints would also endanger lawmakers' families, these bills all died on the calendar. Less encouraging is the fact that AirBNB will once again go shopping in December, and buy more lawmakers to refile a 2020 version of their mercenary legislation, Read Rep. Chip LaMarca's April and May 2019 updates elsewhere in this edition. - [editor]*

Vacation Rentals

I filed HB 1129 in order to provide greater accountability and transparency for the short-term rentals industry, by expanding the definition of "hosting platform". It would require the license number to be displayed in all advertising rentals, and list information in regards to the short-term rental property. This bill will combat the unlicensed commercial operators from developing in the community. The Department of Business and Professional Regulation to would collect information relating to booking short-term rentals, along with informing the city where the property resides, in order to protect our communities from commercial interests.

However HB 987, in regards to vacation rentals, does not hold the same level of accountability that the State of Florida needs. I am not in support of this bill.

May 17, 2019

The 2019 Legislative Session had concluded, and my first as your State Representative, I wanted to update you on several important legislative items.

Once again, the Florida House delivered for Florida's families by passing over \$121 million in broad-based tax cuts. Working closely with our Senate partners, we fulfilled our commitment to bring meaningful tax relief to Florida's families and small businesses.

Sales Tax Holidays

The Legislature approved another Back-to-School Sales Tax Holiday from August 2-6, 2019 where clothing priced \$60 or less, school supplies \$15 or less, and computers and accessories priced \$1,000 or less per item and purchased for personal use will be exempt from state and local sales tax. The tax package also called for another 7-day Hurricane Sales Tax Holiday where sales taxes will be waived for many disaster preparedness supplies including flashlights, portable generators, and batteries from May 31 – June 6, 2019.

Environmental Priorities

I am proud of the House's commitment, along with the Governor, to provide real environmental funding. Our balanced state budget funds a number of critical environmental priorities, including \$686.8 million dedicated to water quality and protection. \$50 million is dedicated for water storage and treatment projects North of Lake Okeechobee, along with funded research that will help prevent harmful algae and red tide by creating the Florida Red Tide Mitigation and Technology Development Initiative. Also, we were successful in receiving \$40 million in reoccurring annual statewide beach nourishment funding.

Firefighter Benefits Bill

This Legislature was able to accomplish what none other was able since 2004 – pass a comprehensive firefighter cancer benefits program. Nationwide, 70% of firefighter line-of-duty deaths in 2016, was cancer-related. This bill grants certain benefits to a firefighter upon receiving a diagnosis of cancer. This is a great victory for our brave men and women who protect and serve our communities every day and I was proud to be a cosponsor and vocal advocate of this great legislation.

Last week, I had the honor of attending the Firefighter Benefits Bill signing in Palm Beach with the Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis. As the Statewide Fire Marshall, CFO Patronis was the biggest advocate for getting this important bill passed. Also in attendance, was former CFO Jeff Atwater who originally filled this bill in 2004 as a state Senator from Palm Beach.




